



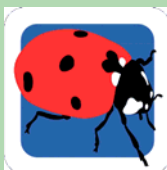

Urban Mammals

Sunday 20 September

9am - 12 noon

(Includes hot brunch)

Find out how to identify, monitor and film urban mammals, including foxes, otters, hedgehogs and moles. Join Kenny Crooks from the Wildlife Trusts' Wild Places project to gain observation and tracking skills. Over recent months, Kenny has been experimenting with filming mammals as part of this project. He will be able to give practical tips on how to capture mammal on film using night CCTV. During the session we will be setting up cameras, viewing film footage and emptying humane small mammal traps.



Autumnal Plants

Sunday 27 September

10.30am - 3.30pm

As summer flowers fade, seeds and fruit ripen. During this practical workshop with the Wildflower Ark we will be taking a closer look at the diversity of seed heads and leaf forms to find out how they provide a valuable plant identification tool. Please bring a picnic lunch.



Birds for Beginners

Sunday 25 October

Times: 10.30am - 3.30pm

This introductory session, led by members of the Teesmouth Bird Club, will enable even the armchair observer to make their daily bird sightings count. Starting with bird identification techniques, covering terminology, flight patterns, and bird song, the day will also introduce participants to a range of bird surveys, monitoring and recording schemes that rely on the records of volunteers.
